AUTHOR GUIDELINES

The submitted manuscripts must be an original work of the author and never be published. *Verbum Christi* accepts an original research paper, both in empirical and conceptual research, which is in line with the focus and scope of the *Verbum Christi's* journal as well as its novelty and contribution to science. The minimum length is 5000 words, exclusive of footnotes, bibliography, table, and graphics. Manuscripts must be written in Bahasa or English. After reading these instructions, the author is expected to download the Manuscript Template.

General Requirements

1. The journal accepts files in Microsoft Word and WPS Office;
2. Footnote citation should be used rather than in-text citation. It must follow the Chicago citation guide;
3. Manuscripts are typed on A4 size paper with a margin of 2,5 cm;
4. There are no strict format requirements on the manuscript's structure, but all manuscripts should contain: title, abstract, introduction, literature review (if any), research methods, results and discussion, conclusion, dan bibliography.

Title

The title should be informative, contain the main keywords and no abbreviations. The title is written in Indonesian and English using titlecase letters.

Author's Name

The title should be informative, contain the main keywords and no abbreviations. The title is written in Indonesian and English using titlecase letters.

Abstract

Abstract consists of 100–150 words and should be written in one paragraph. The abstract contents should include at least research objectives, methods, and findings. The abstract should be written in Bahasa and English. For manuscripts in Bahasa, the English abstract is placed above the Indonesian abstract and vice versa.

Keywords

The manuscript should contain between 3 and 6 keywords that represent the topic of your manuscript, are specific, and are not general in nature.

Introduction

The introduction provides an overview of what is covered in the article. Therefore, the introduction must trigger the reader's attention and interest and state the uniqueness of the research. This part generally consists of (1) background of the problem; (2) gaps in the literature that is addressed in the research (novelty); (3) the purpose of the research and

(4) the contribution of the research. At the end of the introduction section, the structure of the article must be stated.

Literature Review (if any)

The literature review presents theories and scientific opinions that are relevant to the topic under study. In this section, the author can describe the historical background, contemporary context, theories and concepts, and relevant terminology in the manuscript. The author also identifies controversial areas and contested claims in the selected literature. A theoretical or conceptual framework can be presented in a separate chapter and placed before the Research Methods section.

Research Methods

This section describes the steps involved in executing the study. It must be described clearly and thoroughly, including research design, data collection procedures, and data analysis. Justification for particular method usage must also be stated so that the reader can evaluate the suitability and feasibility of the method and the reliability and validity of the research results.

Results

The results should summarize the findings from the data analysis and address the research question and present the data in detail. This section also displays tables and charts, if needed

Discussion

The discussion should explore and interpret the findings but not repeat the findings in the results section. This chapter can also discuss the findings with previous studies and theories presented in the introduction section and theoretical debates in the literature review section (if any). This section is argumentative, which contains the author's stance or attitude. The Discussion section can be incorporated with Results section.

Conclusion

The conclusion should include the main findings and state how the research has contributed to the development of science in the area under study. In addition to emphasizing on contributions, the Conclusions also contain recommendations and research limitations. Quotations should not accompany conclusions.

References

The sources cited should be included in the bibliography following Chicago standards. Authors can use reference management applications, such as Mendeley. Primary literature (i.e. journal articles and proceedings) are preferable, although it can also be

books and research reports. The literature used as a reference should be related to the problem being studied and are expected to have the most recent information (maximum of the last ten years for publication of journals, proceedings, and books).

Manuscript Submission

Manuscripts must be submitted online and created a user account as an Author at first. Authors are required to fill out the registration form correctly and completely. After that, authors can submit manuscripts through the “Send New Manuscript” menu and follow these five steps:

Step 1 – Start Submission. On the “Start” menu, the author can select the appropriate journal section, namely “Articles”, the language of the manuscript, and put a checkmark on the submission checklist.

Step 2 – Uploading Manuscript. To upload a manuscript, click “Add File” on the “Upload Manuscript” menu and select the manuscript document you want to submit.

Step 3 – Uploading Additional Documents. The Copyright Transfer Agreement document needs to be filled out and sent as an additional document in the “Upload Manuscript” menu.

Step 4 – Enter Metadata. In this step, detailed author metadata must be entered, including marking the rest of the authors. After that, the title of the manuscript, abstract, keywords, and references must be uploaded by copying the text and pasting it in the text box.

Step 5 – Submission Confirmation. Authors must re-check the uploaded manuscript documents. To submit a manuscript, click “Submit Submit Manuscript” on the “Confirm” menu. After this submission, the author will receive a confirmation via email. Authors can track submission status at any time by going to the Manuscript Submission page in the “View Incoming Manuscript” menu.
